OVERVIEW:

For the first time, Ohio's Annual Problem Gambling Conference will be a stand-alone workforce development event hosted by the partners of Ohio for Responsible Gambling: the Ohio Casino Control Commission, the Ohio Lottery Commission, the Ohio State Racing Commission and the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services. "Ohio's Response to a Changing Landscape" is an interdisciplinary conference that will bring the latest science and strategies to the state for the goal of reducing problem gambling and treating those with gambling disorder.

Keynote speakers will be Henry R. Lesieur, Ph.D., creator of the South Oaks Gambling Screen (SOGS) on day one and Mark Griffiths on day two. Dr. Griffiths, director of the International Gaming Research Unit at Nottingham Trent University, England, will present on aspects of responsible gambling, online behaviors and how to appeal to better decision-making. Breakout sessions will highlight: community engagement, prevention and responsible gambling, co-occurring addiction disorders, gambling disorder diagnosis, community needs assessment, creating the continuing care plan and development of a new Ohio Problem Gambling Resource Center.

General Session: 1-2:30 p.m.

Screening and Best Practices in Treatment for Problem Gambling

Henry R. Lesieur, Ph.D., PsyD, NCGC II

Staff Psychologist, Department of Psychiatry, Rhode Island Hospital and Rhode Island Gambling Treatment Program

In his keynote presentation, Dr. Lesieur will describe methods and best practices in screening and assessment for gambling, gambling disorder, cravings and cognitive distortions. He will discuss methods used in treatment and recovery from gambling disorder and best practices for treatment and recovery from gambling disorder.

Session 1-A: Using Best Practices in CBT Treatment of Dual Diagnosis and Pathological Gambling

In his breakout session, Dr. Lesieur will describe the physical and mental disorders that are comorbid with pathological gambling. He will discuss the Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) model of treatment for pathological gambling and will talk about the modification of the CBT model in the treatment of comorbid disorders and pathological gambling.

Session 1-B: Ohio Problem Gambling Prevention Resources and Center

This presentation will explore the resources available to both prevention and treatment practitioners, as well as the general community in the new Ohio Problem Gambling Resource Center. It will also be an opportunity to share ideas and needs for further development of the Resource Center. The session will discuss gambling trends in Ohio and strategies communities can implement to prevent problem gambling.

He will specifically delve into how prevalent online addictions are with particular reference to online gambling and gaming addictions and what technological trends are occurring in relation to gambling and gaming.

Ohio's system of behavioral health care, related service organizations and city/county/state government reaches nearly every citizen. Concurrently, gambling for recreation has also reached every corner of the state. This session will look at the science behind the "Until" and "I Lost a Bet" responsible gambling campaigns and will demonstrate how partner organizations can bring these messages into their communities. Specific topics include: examples of community marketing, use of traditional and social media, tailoring messaging to audience and maximizing available marketing dollars.

Session 2-A: Gambling in Social Media: Should We Be Concerned?

In a breakout session, Dr. Griffiths will discuss the definition of social gaming and social gambling and how gambling via social networking sites can impact player behavior. He will further break down the salient issues and concerns regarding the convergence of social gaming and social gambling, and will highlight how psychology is used in the acquisition, development and maintenance of social gaming.

Session 2-B: Gambling Disorder, Co-Occurring Addictions and Recovery

This session will address issues related to co-occurring disorders with gambling, including suicidality, substance abuse issues, domestic violence, depression, anxiety, personality disorders and impacts of co-occurring disorders on the recovery process for the problem and/or pathological gambler.

Session 2-C: DSM-V: From Pathological Gambling to Gambling Disorder

This session will review important changes in the diagnostic definition of problem gambling as published in the recent revision of American Psychiatric Association's *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders*, Fifth Edition (DSM-V). Revisions will be reviewed in conjunction with the evolving research that continues to transform understanding of the disorder.

Session 2-D: Community Needs Assessment for Gambling Baseline

Focusing on step one in the Strategic Prevention Framework process, representatives from several counties will share the tools and tactics they utilized to complete their community needs assessment on problem gambling, including student surveys and environmental scans. Baseline findings from the quantitative and qualitative data that was collected and analyzed will be revealed.

Session 2-E: The Use of Behavioral Tracking in Gambling Research, Responsible Gambling and Social Responsibility

In a breakout session, Dr. Griffiths will discuss what behavioral tracking is and how it can be used both positively and negatively to study consumer behavior for marketing and behavioral science research. This session will look at how behavioral tracking methodologies compare to other research methodologies, with particular reference to survey research. Further, Dr. Griffiths will review some of the results of studies that he has carried out in the area of behavioral tracking and what implications behavioral tracking has on social responsibility in gambling.

Session 2-F: Creating the Treatment/Continuing Care Plan

This training will provide participants with experience writing treatment plans specific to gambling. We will learn ways to integrate gambling treatment in current mental health and AoD treatment plans. We will explore the current trends for gambling treatment curricula, as well as look at a continuing care program for gambling.

Session 2-G: Getting the Community Engaged in Responsible Gambling

This workshop will focus on efforts underway in two areas to bring problem/responsible gambling information to communities via health care, universities and a diverse group of social service organizations. While data from a recent study calls for prevention and treatment efforts of Internet gambling in students, only 22 percent of colleges have a written policy on student gambling. Social marketing strategies to increase student awareness of the risks associated with gambling and a collaborative effort with Ohio University around "March Madness" will be highlighted. The policy recommendations of the National Task Force on College Gambling will also be disseminated and discussed.

Session 2-H: Treating Gambling Disorders: Considerations for the Treatment Provider

Heather A. Chapman, Ph.D., NCGC II/BACC

This session will provide participants with specific tools for treating the client with gambling disorder and other behavioral health concerns. Dr. Chapman will provide insight into using cognitive behavioral therapy, motivational interviewing and other evidence-based models of care. Instruction will include interactive worksheets and case examples for individual, small group and class discussion activities.

Lynn Burkey, PC, LICDC-CS, ICCS, NCGC II/BACC

Lynn Burkey has served the Warren/Youngstown area as a counselor, advisor, supervisor, and administrator for more than 35 years. He has spent 11 years as a counselor and administrator at Rebecca Williams Community Center in Warren, and currently has a 25-year tenure at Meridian Community Care in Youngstown where he has been in charge of gambling treatment services for the past 10 years. Lynn has acted as a community resource on gambling disorder, presenting numerous professional training workshops throughout the state and has appeared on local radio, television and online. He was recently recognized by the National Council on Problem Gambling as a Board Approved Clinical Consultant.

Heather A. Chapman, Ph.D., NCGC II/BACC

Dr. Chapman is Director of the Brecksville Gambling Treatment Program, Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center, a national treatment program for the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Department of Defense in the VA health care system. She is a Nationally Certified Gambling Counselor and Board Approved Clinical Consultant and Supervisor through the National Council on Problem Gambling. She is also a member of the Motivational Interviewing Network of Trainers. With more than 20 years in the field, she has trained clinicians on the treatment of gambling problems and Motivational Interviewing throughout the country.

Jennifer Clegg, LSW, NCGC II/BACC, OCPS II

Jennifer Clegg is the Gambling Program Supervisor at Recovery Resources in Cleveland. She has worked at Recovery Resources for more than 12 years. Jen graduated from Capital University with her Bachelor of Social Work and Cleveland State University with a Master in Social Work. Jen is a Licensed Social Worker (LSW), as well as an Ohio Certified Prevention Specialist (OCPS II). Jen is a National Certified Gambling Counselor (NCGC II) and a Board Approved Clinical Consultant (BACC) for the credential. Jen's experience includes youth prevention services, alcohol and drug addiction services, mental health and gambling addiction services for individuals and families. Jen provides training on gambling addiction and prevention services throughout Ohio.

Speaker Jo Ann Davidson

Speaker Jo Ann Davidson was appointed Chair of the Ohio Casino Control Commission by Gov. John R. Kasich for her extensive leadership in local and state government, as well as her track record of being a strong advocate for the citizens of Ohio. Davidson came to public service in 1967 after winning a seat on the Reynoldsburg City Council. In 1980, she was elected to the Ohio House of Representatives. During her 20-year legislative career, Davidson advocated for welfare reform and played a major role in the deregulation of electricity in the state. In 1995, her fellow representatives selected her as the Speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives. She was the first woman to hold this position, and remained as speaker until leaving the House in 2000.

During the past decade, Davidson has formed her own consulting firm, JAD and Associates, advising on a broad range of issues involving public policy development and analysis, strategic planning and political campaigns. In January 2005, she was elected Co-Chair of the Republican National Committee. She also remains active with various board positions and charity organizations. Davidson has served on the board of trustees of The Ohio State University, Franklin University and the University of Findlay. She holds honorary Doctor of Law degrees from The Ohio University and Capital University, an honorary degree in Government Leadership from the University of Findlay and an honorary Doctor of Public Administration degree from The Ohio State University.

Stacey Frohnapfel-Hasson, MPA

Stacey Frohnapfel-Hasson serves as the Bureau Chief for Problem Gambling Services for the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services' Office of Prevention and Wellness. She is responsible for ensuring that problem gambling prevention, treatment and recovery services are developed and implemented among stakeholder organizations that are partners in this service system, and for the constituents whose needs are being met. While with the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services for 13 years, she served as Communication Chief, overseeing internal and external communications, public education campaigns, outreach and media relations for the Department.

She also worked with the Ohio Association of County Behavioral Health Authorities for several years on advocacy, outreach and project management. She is a Master Trainer for Healthy IDEAS, a depression-prevention model for chronic disease self-management. Stacey has a Master in Public Administration degree from Ohio University and served for six years as a Whitehall city councilperson.

Mark Griffiths, BSc, Ph.D., CPsychol, PGDipHE, FBPsS, FRSA, AcSS

Dr. Mark Griffiths is a Chartered Psychologist and Professor of Gambling Studies at the Nottingham Trent University, and Director of the International Gaming Research Unit. He is internationally known for his work in gambling and gaming addictions, and has won 14 awards including the American 1994 John Rosecrance Research Prize for outstanding scholarly contributions to the field of gambling research, the 1998 European CELEJ Prize for best paper on gambling, the 2003 Canadian International Excellence Award for outstanding contributions to the prevention of problem gambling and the practice of responsible gambling and a North American 2006 Lifetime Achievement Award for contributions to the field of youth gambling in recognition of his dedication, leadership and pioneering contributions to the field of youth gambling. His most recent award is the 2013 Lifetime Research Award from the National Council on Problem Gambling.

He has published three books, more than 120 book chapters, more than 400 research papers and more than 1,000 other articles. He also is a freelance journalist and has appeared on more than 2,500 radio and television programs since 1988. In 2004 he was awarded the Joseph Lister Prize for Social Sciences by the British Association for the Advancement of Science for being one of the UK's outstanding scientific communicators. His awards also include the 2006 Excellence in the Teaching of Psychology Award by the British Psychological Society and the British Psychological Society Fellowship Award for exceptional contributions to psychology.

Mary Haag, RN, BSN, OCPS I, ICPS

Mary Haag graduated from the College of Mt. St. Joseph with a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing and is licensed as a Registered Nurse in the state of Ohio. She specializes in prevention and wellness and is an Ohio and internationally certified prevention specialist. With more than 18 years of achievement in substance abuse prevention, coalition building/collaborative partnerships and non-profit management, Mary currently is the President and CEO for the Coalition for a Drug-Free Greater Cincinnati. Henry R. Lesieur, Ph.D., PsyD, NCGC II

Henry R. Lesieur has a Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and a PsyD in clinical psychology from the Massachusetts School of Professional Psychology. He taught sociology at St. John's University from 1978 to 1992 and was the chair then full professor of criminal justice at Illinois State University from 1992 to 1997. He was a member of the working group on Disorders of Impulse Control for the American Psychiatric Association and conducted research that validated the DSM-III-R and DSM-IV criteria for pathological gambling. Dr. Lesieur is a past member of the Board of Directors of the National Council on Problem Gambling in the United States, as well as on the advisory board of different state problem gambling advocacy and research organizations both in the United States and internationally. He is currently the Vice President of the Rhode Island Council on Problem Gambling.

He recently retired from Rhode Island Hospital where he was a clinical psychologist in the outpatient department of psychiatry. He has treated problem gamblers, as well as individuals with a wide range of other disorders. He is
